SCHOLARSHIP IN PROGRESS

Justice that Love Gives. The work is a follow-up manuscript to *A Different Justice*, which will seek to unify theorizing about justice and theorizing about crime through the conception of love offered in *A Different Justice*. Coauthored with Tammy Garland. The work is under contract with Lexington Press, and is due 15 January, 2018.

Good, Evil, Saints and Sinners. This is a manuscript in process wherein I will examine the nature of theological influence on American justice ideas. Specifically, common ideas like “good” and “evil” will be interrogated. Ultimately, the hope is to craft an ideological / theological path to a more authentically loving justice narrative.

Justice: A conversation. Hal Pepinsky and I have begun an exchange of letters wherein we contemplate the nature of justice.

To climb steep hills: peacebuilding in Ferguson. Unstructured interviews with community members and police officers represent my first effort to aid the process of reknitting the brokenness on all sides in Ferguson, Missouri.

Love and the deepest dark. This is the first work in which I seek to examine a problem of harm – profound harm – from the criminological perspective discussed in *A Different Justice*. I am examining the many crimes of King Leopold II and his entourage in the creation and management of the Congo Free State, and the continuing brokenness that exists in the DRC.

Mindfulness and its potential benefits for police officers. The job of a police officer is complex, demanding, conspicuous, laden with myths and tradition, oftentimes stressful, and occasionally terror-filled. Authority and responsibility, latitude and oversight collide in unique ways in the law enforcement workplace. It can be argued that the more psychologically demanding a job, the more the need for nurturance and support (Goleman, 2002). It is to provide such support that I have envisioned an intervention program for police departments designed (a) to inoculate officers against the many stressors in their job, both from within and without; and (b) to prepare them more completely for critical incidents.

Mindfulness in criminal justice. Currently in the planning process, this work will be an edited volume which will examine mindfulness practices in relation to justice practice (police, courts and corrections), and will document benefits of mindfulness skills in application to justice service.

Why American Justice is Broken, and How to Fix It. This is a treatment of thought about love and justice, mine and others, for a wider audience. The aim is to publish this work through a bigger press for wide distribution.
