

The School of Criminology and Criminal Justice (SCCJ) at Arizona State University invites applications for two non tenure-track faculty positions to begin August 16, 2018. Appointment may be made at the rank of lecturer, senior lecturer, or principal lecturer, depending on education and teaching experience. Lecturers are full-time, benefits-eligible, academic-year (9-month) faculty members who teach four courses per semester during the academic year and are expected to engage in service activities to the SCCJ, our college, our university, the profession, and the community. The primary teaching duties for one lecturer will be focused on law-related courses on ASU's campus in Downtown Phoenix, Arizona, although teaching assignments may also periodically include in-person instruction on ASU's campuses in Tempe or Glendale, Arizona, as well as online. Contingent upon funding and enrollment needs, a second lecturer position may be filled with primary teaching duties in courses related to inequality in the criminal justice system (race/ethnicity and crime; gender and crime) and other areas of interest within the applicant's areas of specialization. Again, primary courses assignments will be on ASU's campus in Downtown Phoenix, Arizona, although teaching assignments may also periodically include in-person instruction on ASU's campuses in Tempe or Glendale, Arizona, as well as online.

Job Duties of the Law-Related Position:

The specific responsibilities of the law-related lecturer position include the following:

- teaching undergraduate and graduate courses related to the legal aspects of criminology and criminal justice (e.g., substantive criminal law, constitutional criminal procedure, evidence, correctional law, discretionary justice, law and social control, mock trial, etc.);

- engaging in service within Arizona State University at the school, college, and university levels;
- providing service to the community and the profession; and
- participating in curriculum development, program planning, and student advisement.

Required Qualifications for the Law-Related Position:

Successful applicants must demonstrate the ability to contribute to the mission of the School and College through teaching and service. In addition, the following qualifications are required:

- A J.D., LL.M., or S.J.D. earned from a law school accredited by the American Bar Association;
- At least three years of experience in the practice of law or, alternatively, one year of full-time experience as a judicial law clerk;
- At least one semester of undergraduate or graduate-level teaching experience; and
- Evidence of, or the potential for, teaching effectiveness.

Desired Qualifications for the Law-Related Position:

- A master's or doctoral degree in criminology, criminal justice, or a related social-scientific field from a regionally-accredited university (in addition to the J.D. degree);
- Active or inactive status as a member of a state bar;
- Experience working in one of the criminal justice professions (e.g., policing, corrections, criminal prosecution, criminal defense, criminal court judge, etc.); and
- One or more years of undergraduate or graduate-level teaching experience with strong evidence of teaching effectiveness.

Job Duties of the Criminology/Criminal Justice Lecturer Position:

The specific responsibilities of the criminology/criminal justice lecturer position include the following:

- teaching undergraduate and graduate courses related to criminology and criminal justice;
- engaging in service within Arizona State University at the school, college, and university levels;
- providing service to the community and the profession; and participating in curriculum development, program planning, and student advisement.

Required Qualifications for the Criminology/Criminal Justice Lecturer Position:

Successful applicants must demonstrate the ability to contribute to the mission of the School and College through teaching and service. In addition, the following qualifications are required:

- A master's degree in criminology, criminal justice, or a closely-related social science (e.g., political science, sociology, psychology) from a regionally-accredited university;
- At least one semester of undergraduate or graduate-level teaching experience; and
- Evidence of, or the potential for, teaching effectiveness.

Desired Qualifications for the Criminology/Criminal Justice Lecturer Position:

- An earned doctoral degree in criminology, criminal justice, or a related social-scientific field from a regionally-accredited university;
- The ability to teach courses in race, ethnicity, and crime; and gender and crime;
- Experience working in one of the criminal justice professions (e.g., policing, courts, corrections, etc.); and
- One or more years of undergraduate or graduate-level teaching experience with strong evidence of teaching effectiveness.
