Seattle University invites applications for a tenure-track Assistant Professor in the Criminal Justice Department starting Fall, 2019. The Criminal Justice Department offers BA and BS degrees with specializations in Administration of Justice, Criminology, Forensic Psychology, and Forensic Science, a MA degree in Criminal Justice with concentrations in Investigative Criminology, Victimology, and Criminal Justice Research and Evaluation, a joint MA/JD Degree with the Seattle University School of Law, and an online Crime Analysis Certificate program. The BA, BS, and MA Degree programs are certified with the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences. Our faculty is comprised of accomplished teachers and active scholars.

The ideal candidate will have teaching and research expertise that contributes to the MACJ Investigative Criminology and Victimology specializations, online Crime Analysis Certificate Program, and undergraduate program curriculum. Research specialization is open, but strong consideration will be given to candidates with research specializations in the intersections of race/class/gender, law and social control, and crime and global criminal justice.

Responsibilities for this position include: teaching graduate, online, and undergraduate courses; progressive and continuing scholarship; and departmental and university service.

Requirements: PhD in Criminal Justice/Criminology or closely related discipline, substantial record or promise of excellence in scholarship and teaching, and ability to teach a range of courses across the curriculum including law and social control, deviance, critical criminology, gender, race, and crime, victimology, research methods and statistics. JDs (without PhD) and ABDs who do not demonstrate a strong likelihood of degree completion by start of the 2019 Fall quarter will not be considered.
