Overview

St. John Fisher College, Rochester, New York, invites applications for the position of Assistant Professor in Criminology & Criminal Justice. The College, an independent, liberal arts institution founded in 1948, is a collaborative community dedicated to teaching and learning in a personalized educational environment. St. John Fisher College is guided by its Catholic heritage and its founders, the Basilian Fathers, whose motto “Teach me goodness, discipline, and knowledge” permeates the campus. Through an education rooted in the liberal arts, the College prepares individuals for lives of intellectual, professional, and civic integrity, in which diversity and service to others are valued and practiced (www.sjfc.edu).

Offering 33 academic majors, as well as eleven pre-professional programs, nine master’s programs, and three doctoral programs, the College enrolls approximately 4,000 total undergraduate and graduate students. For the fourth year in a row, St. John Fisher College has been named by U.S. News & World Report to the list of America’s Best Colleges in the National Universities category and has been cited on “America’s Top Colleges” published by Forbes.com. The College also ranked in several other Forbes Top Colleges sub-lists, including Best Private Colleges, Best Research Universities, and Best Colleges in the Northeast and is proud to have been named to the 2016 Military Friendly Schools list.

The Department of Criminology & Criminal Justice is located in the School of Arts and Sciences and offers a 39-credit major, as well as an 18-credit minor, in criminal justice. A Bachelor of Arts is awarded upon completion.

Job Responsibilities

The selected candidate will be expected to teach traditional and innovative courses at all levels of the undergraduate degree. These will include introductory courses to the field of criminal justice, along with the sub-fields of policing, law, and punishment (institutional/community). The instruction of advanced courses in selected topics (e.g., women and crime, police and the law, criminal justice policy) also will be required. St. John Fisher College values collaborative learning and civic engagement. The ideal candidate will be engaged in building community partnerships. Additionally, faculty will be expected to engage in some online or hybrid course development. The teaching load is three courses per semester, with summer offerings possible as well. In addition, the successful candidate will be responsible for student advisement, service to the College, and active scholarly agenda.
