

The Department of Criminology, Law, and Justice in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences at the University of Illinois at Chicago invites applicants for two tenure-track assistant professor positions beginning Fall 2019 subject to budgetary approval. The preferred areas of research specialization are community/gun or gang violence for one position and crimmigration or immigration and crime for the other. Both positions will build on the strengths of the existing faculty. Scholars with expertise in quantitative and qualitative methods and conducting basic, applied, or public policy research that affect marginalized and/or immigrant communities are invited to apply, as are scholars who adopt innovative, critical, and multidisciplinary approaches. A record of grant-writing is a plus.

The successful candidate will have a Ph.D. in criminology, criminal justice, political science, justice studies, psychology, sociology, public health, social work, or a related discipline. Well-qualified candidates will be considered if completion of PhD degree occurs before the start date.

Applicants are expected to actively contribute to the research mission of the department. Candidates should be prepared to teach core courses in the graduate and undergraduate curriculum and mentor and advise graduate and undergraduate students. For fullest consideration application material should be received by December 3, 2018, at which time review of applicants' materials will commence, continuing until the positions are filled.
